



Paper-II: Creative portrait painting (Rendering) (Practical)

Size: 1/4 Imperial

Medium: Any medium

Duration: 3 hours

Two Dimensional Creative Portrait should be rendered with emphasis on stylization, colour scheme and texture etc.

Submission work

A. 5 plates Study from Creative portrait painting (Rendering)

B. 25 sketches size 1/4 Imperial

Note: Submission of work will be submitted to the Head of the Department of Drawing and Painting of college fifteen days before the commencement of the examination. The marks in this submission will be awarded by the subject teacher (internal). However, the external examiner shall be empowered to review the work of the submission in case there is a drastic difference between the marks of examination and submission.

Submission work will be retained till the conduction of examination and will be returned on the practical exam day.

Note:

- A. Candidate should pass in theory as well as the practical paper separately.
- B. There should be 09 hrs for the regular study including two hours for sketching.
- C. Minimum three demonstrations should be arranged by the subject expert during the session for each practical paper.
- D. The Department should also arrange for an educational tour to Ancient Art Centres like Ajanta, Ellora, Elephanta, Khajuraho, Mahabalipuram, etc. once a year. Also Department should conduct one day local tour of Art Galleries such as JKK etc.
- E. Practical examination will be conducted at the centres and the practical work will be examined external examiner. The examiner will examine the answer books in consultation with and internal examiner who is the subject teacher of the Department of Drawing and Painting. University may centralize the practical examinations at few well equipped Departments to hold examination economically.
